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PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

SOCBC ANNUAL CLUB SECTIONAL

Our Open Sectional was a smashing success. Players and game directors lauded us with praise for running a "wonderful", "fabulous", best", "favorite sectional", "a positive and joyful event."

We reached capacity with 35 tables Saturday morning, consisting of 21 tables of Open Pairs and 14.5 tables of 0-500 Pairs. Saturday afternoon we had one fewer table, with 20.5 Open Pairs tables, nine 0-500 pairs tables and five 0-100 Pairs tables. On Sunday we had 30 Open Swiss Team tables for both sessions and two and a half 0-500 tables during the morning session.

A total of 559.04 masterpoints were earned by 183 players. Cathy Bauer amassed the greatest number of Silver Master Points (SMPs) (17.63) with Susan and John Kissinger a close second (15.44). Susan Froome and Sylvia Srigley won the Saturday Morning 0-500 pairs event with a 61.53% game (2.86 SMPs). Rose Gong and Sara Liu finished second with a 59.58% game (2.17 SMPs). Hongsa Situ and Weishu Wu won the Saturday Morning Gayle Andrews Open Pairs Event with a 65.96% game (10.54 SMPs). Robert Shore and Kent Hartman finished second with a 61.92% game (7.91 SMPs). Stacy Harrison and Barry Fortlage won the Saturday afternoon, 0-100 Pairs with a 71.88% game (1.38 SMPs). Eileen Mackenzie and Melinda Konopisos finished second with a 56.88% game (1.04SMPs). Rose Gong and Sarah Liu won the Saturday afternoon, 0-500 pairs event with a 60.71% game (2.17 SMP). James and Kellie Almy finished second with a 56.85% game (1.65 SMPs). Susan and John Kissinger won the Saturday afternoon Open Pairs with a 66.5% game (10.31 SMPs). Giacomo Beretta and Robert Corey finished second with a 63.87% game (7.73SMPs). and Cathy Bauer won the two session Swiss Teams event, with Gale Senter, Subba Ravipudi, Wirt Gilliam and Judy Elbogen finishing second. Judy Brown and Michael Vernia won the Sunday morning 0-500 pairs with a 75% game (1.49 SMPs), followed by Beverly Germain and Carole Gabos with a 70% game (1.14 SMPs).

PRO AM GAME

Congratulations to Patricia Jennings and Jeff Rocklin for their winning 61% game among 17 tables at the February Pro Am. Right behind them were Barbara Smith and Leslie Levine with 60%. If you don't know Leslie, she is one of our very strong pre-Covid regulars who then became an online player. Welcome back, Leslie! John Jonas and Sharon Donoff worked hard recruiting PROs for all the AMs and creating perfect pairings. Janie Matlaf worked hard on publicizing the game, and she ended up having to go home because her NLM partner was among the No Shows. ACE OF CLUBS & MINI-McKENNEY AWARDS

The "Mini-McKenney" and "Ace of Clubs" awards are competitions that recognize bridge players who earn the most masterpoints during a calendar year, with the key distinction being that the Mini-McKenney Continued on next page

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focuses on overall masterpoints earned across all face-to-face sanctioned events, while the Ace of Clubs specifically recognizes achievements in club-level games only; both awards are categorized by masterpoint level, meaning players compete within their respective skill brackets.

SOCBC will present awards to our 2024 winners on Friday, April 11th at noon. We will serve light appetizers and dessert to those playing in our games that afternoon and those receiving awards. Come celebrate with us.

EDUCATION

I want to highlight some of the key topics scheduled for Friday mornings in March. While they offer valuable subjects every week, this coming month will have a slightly different focus.

The first Friday will be about scoring. Those who are aware of the score for making or setting various contracts have the advantage of knowing when to bid boldly, when to sacrifice, and when to push opponents beyond their comfort zone. If you are not clear on how scoring works, be sure to attend.

The second Friday morning is about results. After your games, are you using the hand records and online results page to review and learn what went right and what went wrong?

The third Friday will be about completing a convention card. We don't require players to have convention cards in the limited games, but they are required in the Open games and at Sectionals, Regionals and Nationals. When open players prepare for a game with a new partner, they always go through the card to identify what partnership agreements they will be using. Many of the basic conventions you learn in beginning bridge, such as weak twos, ace-asking bids, and Stayman may evolve into more complex treatments as you gain experience. Completing a convention card at any level of experience is a wonderful way to make sure that you and your partner are on the same page.

We don't often hold classes beyond the beginner level because most of our advanced players learn from each other and from reading. In February John Kissinger gave a class for intermediates and advanced players on why he plays Bailey Weak Twos. He explained that the class title was a bit of a misnomer since Bailey isn't really a weak two, rather a light opening bid. Another of John's favorite bids is the topic for his upcoming March 12th session on Suction. It's a valuable way to interfere over the opponent's open of No Trump or Two Clubs. If you are playing in the Open game, you know that interference is critical if you want to be equal to or above the field

The September beginners wrapped up in February, and were fortunate to have Lisa and David Merenbach offer three extra weeks of supervised play on Monday mornings. Now with the start of a new beginner's series on the first Monday in March, we hope to see the class of February 2025 moving on to Tuesday mornings, Friday mornings, and all afternoon games. Please welcome them into the SOCBC community and help them along.

PARKING

The leasing office has asked us to please be more conscientious about parking in our allowed areas. Our allotted number of spots is based on the number of square feet in our suite. Because we drive so many cars compared to other businesses in our complex, we must park slightly further away. The leasing office and other tenants require that spaces be available for their customers. As a reminder, we are **NOT** to park in any spaces along the row directly in front of our entrance, or in the row across from our entrance. We are **NOT** to park on the side of the building directly across from us. We are **NOT** to park in the spaces directly in front of the leasing office or the businesses adjacent to the leasing office. You may park on the side of our building, leaving at least four spaces for the leasing office. You can park behind our building and across from there. You may park facing the cemetery.

Handicapped parking is an exception if you have a valid handicapped permit. We will be preparing a new parking map to share with our members shortly.

For those of you not familiar with Eight is Enough Swiss Teams, teams are formed based on the magical number 8. **A** players are assigned three points each, **B** players two each, and **C** players one each – all based on their number of masterpoints. Even if you are not a CPA you can see where this is going. Two A players would have to team with two C players to keep within the magic number, eight. Four B players could team up, or one A, two B's and a C could team up. Any combination below eight works for 'Eight is Enough.' Sound like something you want to try? Team Games are played on the second Wednesday and fourth Sunday of the month.

KIBITZING AT THE CLUB

If you're a beginner, as I am, you've probably heard our wonderful Education Coordinator, Janie Matlaf recommend *Kibitzing* as an excellent way to learn more about the game.

Well, on a recent Friday I had the opportunity to kibitz with Life Masters Sunny Foster and Gary Waldron! They both were so gracious and offered many tips and reasons for their bidding, and insight into their play of the hand.

It was fun sitting at their tables and seeing all the other Life Masters play their hands so smoothly. Everyone was so warm and welcoming. It was helpful to watch how Sunny or Gary bid and played those difficult or big hands we all get and made me feel a little more at ease with the game.

If you are available or want to kibitz, just check-in with the Director and ask if you can kibitz with someone. Thank you, Sunny and Gary!

Since becoming strictly a Kindle reader, holding a real book in my hands is a rarity. I make an exception for bridge books, especially one of my all-time favorites, Marty Bergen's Points Schmoints.

Bergen's non-playing mom gave him some books while he was recovering from a tonsillectomy at age 14. One was a bridge book, which he devoured, and it became the impetus for his eventual career.

Fast forward 30-plus years, and his goal was to write a book that was very practical and at the same time very readable. In addition to a plethora of spot-on tips, there are many entertaining passages. He tells the story of Mr. Bridge who instructed Mrs. Bridge to point to her ring finger if she likes diamonds. After he went down doubled in 4 hearts he asked her, "What were you thinking? You had no points and only one heart." Taken aback, Mrs. Bridge explained that putting her hand on her chest was not a signal for hearts. It was a signal for a bust.

The book covers just about every aspect of the game, from the auction to declarer play, defense and etiquette. He presumes you know the basics of bridge and offers insight to help enhance your decision-making skills.

When I first read the book as an aspiring beginner, I had so many 'Aha' moments. One was page 72, entitled 'Stand Tall After a 1NT Overcall.' Do you and your partners have an agreement for responding after opponent interferes with 1NT? After reading this chapter, you will see the value of making an agreement.

Page 85 was another 'Aha' moment. Your partner opens 3 Hearts or 3 Spades and you have a huge hand with a void in partner's suit. His comment: You may be wondering about 3NT... In all the years I have been playing bridge, I have never responded 3NT to partner's 3-Heart or 3-Spade bid. Does that give you an idea of how rarely the perfect hand comes along?"

As the title implies, Bergen emphasizes the benefit of looking beyond high card points. Distribution and continuous reevaluation during the auction are often much more important. Each suggestion is supported with examples and clear hand comparisons.

As far as I'm concerned, Bergen accomplished his goal. Advancing beginners and intermediate players can learn a great deal from Points Schmoints, and should find it an easy read. Let me know if you agree.

REPORT ON PRO-AM GAME OF FEBRUARY 20, 2025

We just had our first Pro-Am of 2025. It was successful in that we had a good-sized game. I am pleased to run these Pro-Ams and get a lot of positive comments about how much everybody enjoys the game. Below is a description of what went wrong, and I now must consider having people pay ahead of time so we do not have noshows. I hope everyone will understand that signing up for these games is a commitment that must be honored by showing up or notifying me that you cannot play at least a day in advance.

Up to Wednesday we had 19 tables with all pairs being a LM and an NLM as intended. Unfortunately, eight NLMs did not show up. One was a last-minute emergency cancellation; two cancelled via email or call and one left a message on the Club's phone Wednesday night which no one could pick up until Thursday morning, too late to adjust pairs. Therefore, four people signed up but did not call or show up.

As a result, two NLM players who were on a wait-list did not get to play. Also, six LM players had to play with other LMs to fill out the tables and allow them to play as they planned. These LMs formed five pairs who became ineligible for master points. For the actual game we had 14.5 Tables of mixed pairs; 2.5 tables of all LMs for a total of 17 tables.

I know we can do better. I will have to decide how best to stop this from happening again. I will let you know how I intend to do that.

Thanks to everyone who showed up as they promised.

TUESDAY MORNINGS: 0-20 SUPERVISED PLAY WITH MINI-LESSON

WEDNESDAY MORNING: MARCH 12, 10 - 11:30 AM. John Kissinger teaches SUCTION

Suction defense allows you to bid all one-suiter and all six touching and non-touching 2-suiters against NT and strong 1C or 2C openings. John finds this to be superior to other defensive conventions like DONT or Hamilton because you specifically identify both of your two suits when showing a two-suiter. Whether or not you play Suction, come and learn what to do when opponents use suction against you.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOONS: 0-20 MP SUPERVISED PLAY 12:30-4:00PM

This should be the first step for all our beginners. You may bring your notes, ask your questions, and start practicing in a stress-free environment. Come with or without a partner, and no reservation is required.

Plan to stay for 12 to 15 boards, which can run until approximately 4 PM. Late arrival makes it challenging for us to arrange the table movement and partnerships, so try to be there with time to spare. This is a learning game where you can practice with volunteer mentors at the tables. Masterpoints are awarded to the top scorers.
